

A1 Movers Listening Part 2

Description

This lesson plan has been designed to help students prepare for A1 Movers Listening Part 2. This lesson plan can be delivered face to face or online. The 'online options' column suggests how the stages could be adapted for teaching online.

In this lesson students identify key vocabulary before completing a series of listening activities using an A1 Movers Listening Part 2 recording, which helps build familiarity with the exam text and task.

Time required: 40-50 minutes

 - **Audio recording** - A1 Movers Listening Part 2
 - **Video story**
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- Aims:**
- To review and develop students' 'zoo' vocabulary
 - To practise listening for gist and specific details.
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Procedure:

Lesson Stages	Online options
<p>Welcome</p> <p>Greet the students.</p>	
<p>Vocabulary challenge</p> <p>Put students into groups.</p> <p>Cover <u>Handout 1</u> with another sheet of paper, then hold them up so all students can see them. Slowly move the covering sheet of paper to reveal a small part of one of the pictures on <u>Handout 1</u>. Ask students to guess what the picture is.</p> <p>Award points to the first group to guess correctly, repeat with the other pictures on <u>Handout 1</u>.</p>	<p>Use your platform's whiteboard to display the picture – and a drawing object to cover it.</p> <p>Otherwise, print <u>Handout 1</u> and use another sheet of paper to do this stage over your webcam</p>
<p>Preparing to listen</p> <p>Tell students they will listen to some people talking about a special day. All the things in the pictures are mentioned. Ask them to think individually, then speak in groups about what the recording could be about.</p> <p>Ask groups to share their ideas. Help students to think of titles</p>	<p>Give students individual thinking time, then ask them to type "yes" into the chat when they think of a connection between the pictures.</p> <p>Choose students who have</p>

<p>for their ideas and write them on the board, for example:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • “my holiday in the jungle” • “a school trip to the zoo” • “my friend’s strange pets” <p>Make sure you include “a school trip to the zoo” (that’s the correct answer)</p> <p>Play the beginning of the audio recording (5:23 - 5:40) and ask students to choose the best title. Check answers.</p>	<p>typed “yes” to turn on their microphones and explain their answers.</p> <p>Display possible titles for the recording on your platform’s whiteboard and ask students to listen and choose the best one.</p>
<p>Listening 1</p> <p>Agree and practise actions for each of the pictured items (a big roar for the tiger, eating noises for the burger, etc).</p> <p>Tell students to do the actions whenever one of the pictured items is mentioned. Play audio recording (5:50 – 8:05).</p> <p>Give <u>Handout 1</u> to each student and ask them to write the names of the pictures in the spaces.</p> <p>Tell students to write numbers in the boxes on <u>Handout 1</u>, to show the order in which the pictured items appear in the recording.</p> <p>Play audio recording (5:50 – 8:05), stopping after each section and checking answers.</p>	<p>If your students have webcams, encourage them to suggest actions for each picture – otherwise do this yourself, asking them to follow along at home.</p> <p>Share <u>Handout 1</u> with students’ parents before the lesson, so they can print and provide copies of the worksheets.</p> <p>Otherwise display handouts on your platform’s whiteboard and ask all students to write their answer to specific questions in the chat.</p>
<p>Listening 2</p> <p>Give a copy of <u>Handout 2</u> to each student.</p> <p>Ask students to complete it individually. Explain that it’s OK if they cannot remember everything, they will listen again to check.</p> <p>Check students’ answers. Ask them to spell out numbers and words (this is helpful in the Movers listening exam).</p> <p>Play audio recording (5:50 – 8:05), stopping after each section, allowing students to update their answers.</p>	<p>Share handouts with parents, or students through your platform before the lesson.</p> <p>If students are unable to write on printed handouts, ask them to look at a copy on their screen while writing answers in a notebook.</p>
<p>Reading</p> <p>Put students into groups and explain they are going to have a quiz.</p> <p>Display the first quiz question from <u>Handout 3</u> as an example on the board. Ask whether it is true or false (<i>false</i>). Ask students to circle the incorrect information. Tell students they will do the same, but in their groups.</p> <p>Display the remaining true/false questions one at a time, with groups marking them T/F, and circling any incorrect information within an agreed time limit. Allow groups to refer to <u>Handout 2</u> (this provides reading practice).</p> <p>Check answers and award points after each question. Ask</p>	<p>Ask students to do this quiz individually. Create an interactive quiz on https://kahoot.com/</p>

<p>students what the false sentences <i>should</i> say instead. If you have a very strong class you could ask them to write the correct sentences/</p>	
<p>Listening and writing (optional extension/homework task for strong students)</p> <p>Ask students questions about the previous activity:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • How many sentences were there? <i>10</i> • What did they describe? <i>The audio recording</i> • Were they all correct? <i>No</i> • Were some of them correct? <i>Yes</i> <p>Tell students they are going to make their own quiz using another story about a zoo. Play the Video story.</p> <p>Ask students to write sentences describing the story (as many as possible within a time limit). Some should be true, others false.</p> <p>Ask groups to swap sentences.</p> <p>Groups work to identify the true sentences and correct the false ones.</p>	<p>This activity can be completed individually – either during the class or as homework.</p> <p>Ask parents to send you their child’s sentences. Add them all to a shared online document (https://padlet.com/ for example).</p> <p>When complete (you may need to correct their writing a little), share the link and ask students to try and complete each other’s activities by identifying which sentences are true/false and making corrections.</p>
