

A2 Flyers Reading and Writing Part 1

Description

This lesson plan has been designed to help students prepare for A2 Flyers Reading and Writing Part 1. This lesson plan can be delivered face to face or online. The 'online options' column gives teachers ideas about how the stages could be adapted for teaching online.

In this lesson students work through a series of stages in which they match people, objects and places to written descriptions. Students develop their confidence building up to the task through a series of stages before finally writing their own descriptions as part of a competitive group activity.

Time required:		
Materials required:	An object in a box (something that Flyers students will know, for example a toy car, sweets, a dictionary or money).

Aims:	To recognise possible features of a good description.	
	 To understand written and spoken descriptions of things, people and places. 	
	 To develop familiarity with A2 Flyers Reading and Writing Part 1 	

Procedure:

Lesson Stages	Online options	
Welcome		
Greet students and tell them something fun you've done since the last lesson.	Ask your students to use their microphones, or type in the chat – whichever they prefer.	
Allow students to individually say hello and share something enjoyable that they have done recently.		
Wordsearch challenge		
Put students into groups. Give the groups <u>Handout 1</u> and tell them not to unfold it (fold <u>Handout 1</u> so the second set of clues are covered).	Do this as a whole class activity: display the wordsearch using a collaborative whiteboard	
Tell groups to work together to find the words described, within the grid.	(https://jamboard.google.com/) Ask students to highlight the answer	
After a few minutes, tell students to unfold <u>Handout 1</u> and use those clues to complete the wordsearch.	as they find them.	



Check wordsearch answers.	Display clues using your platform's	
Ask students which clues were more helpful. The second set provides extra information that helps us understand: what, where, when, why, how often, or how big something is.	chat.	
Reading descriptions		
Put students into groups.	Manage this stage as a whole-class	
Write on the board: "This is something you write on"	activity, asking students to share their ideas in the chat.	
Tell groups to note all the possible answers they can think of. For example, paper, notebook, envelope, computer, postcard etc.	their ideas in the chat.	
Add more of the description: "and send to a friend" Ask students which answers could still be possible.		
Give the rest of the description: "when you are on holiday." And ask students to choose an answer from Handout 2. (a postcard).

Tell students that <u>Handout 2</u> is the A2 Flyers Reading and Writing Part 1.	Share handouts with parents, or students through your platform	
2. Ask them	before the lesson.	
 what they need to do. (write words next to the descriptions.) how many descriptions there are. (10) how many words they have to choose from. (15) if they need to use all the words. (No) 	Manage feedback by going through the questions one-by-one, asking students to write their answers in the chat.	
Tell students to do the activity individually, completing as many as possible in 5 minutes before comparing with group members.		
4. Check answers as a whole class.		
Now you do it!		
Write on the board, "You find this thing	Ask students to individually send	
Tell students this description is from the previous activity – but you have removed some of the words. What are they? What are they describing?	you their descriptions. Use these to create a quiz (https://kahoot.com/for example) which can be completed individually.	
"You find this <u>round and black</u> thing <u>on the wheels of cars</u> <u>and motorbikes</u> ." – a tyre.	completed marriadally.	
Ask what types of words go in the gaps (adjectives – describing words / nouns – things or places).		
Challenge students to describe the moon in this way. For example, "You find this <u>silver circle</u> thing <u>in the sky at night</u> ."		
Give students <u>Handout 3</u> . Ask them to use gapped sentences to write descriptions for different things (if		



students find it hard to think of things, tell them they can get ideas from objects they can see in their house).

Collect the students' descriptions and put students into groups. Use a selection of their descriptions as questions for a class guiz.

What's in the box? (optional speaking task)

Tell students you're going to play a guessing game.

Tell students you have something in a box. They must guess what it is. Explain the rules:

- a) Each student can only guess once. For example, "Is it a...?".
- b) Students can ask as many questions as they like. But you can only answer their questions 'yes' or 'no'. For example, "Is it made of paper?", not, "What is it made of?"

Ask students to discuss information that may help them identify the object. Write suggestions on the board. For example:

material / colour / size / weight / what it's used for / when it's used / smell etc

Tell students to raise their hand if they want to ask a question – or to stand if they want to use their one guess. Then start the game.

Afterwards congratulate the winner and ask students which bits of information helped them identify the object.

Tell students to each write the name of an object, person or place on a piece of paper, but not to show it to anyone else.

Put students in groups and tell them to take turns trying to identify each other's words with as few questions as possible.

Show students the box using your webcam. Depending on the size of the class and your platform's functionality you could allow students to ask questions with their microphones, or by typing them into the chat.

If you are able to safely manage breakout rooms, use them to enable students to complete this activity in groups.

If your platform has a 'raise you hand' functionality, students can use this. Alternatively, students raise their hands so you can see on the webcam.


